Hepatitis A virus is in the feces of people who have the virus.



- If a person with the virus doesn't wash his or her hands after going to the bathroom, fecal matter can transfer to objects, food, drinks or drugs.
- When these things are shared, other people can unknowingly swallow the virus.
- If a person who has the virus comes in close contact with others—like during sex—the virus can spread.

Stop the spread of hepatitis A:



- Wash your hands with soap and water after you use the bathroom, and before you eat and drink.
- Don't share personal items, food, drinks or drugs.

COMMON SYMPTOMS:

- Stomach pain
- Nausea and vomiting
- Yellow skin or eyes



Hepatitis A can lead to serious liver problems, even death.
